student to participate in learning without posing a risk to the health or safety of any student or school district personnel.

Students must wear clothing including both a shirt with pants or skirt, or the equivalent (for example dresses, leggings, or shorts) and shoes. Shirts and dresses must have fabric in the front and on the sides (under the arms).

Clothing must cover undergarments (waistbands and straps excluded). Fabric covering breasts, genitals and buttocks must be opaque.




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Parent Responsibility. Board Policy 4.30.012 provides: "The responsibility for the dress and grooming of a student rests primarily with the student and his or her parents or guardians." Parents or guardians are responsible for ensuring student compliance with the school dress code.

Student Responsibility. All students at all schools are responsible for complying with the district dress code during school hours and school activities.

Staff Responsibility. To equitably enforce the district dress code, teachers, administrators and all school staff must be notified of the policy at the beginning of the school year with a refresher in March before Spring Break in regards to its purpose and spirit, and how to enforce it without shaming students or
